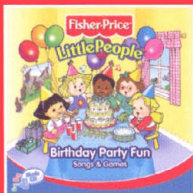
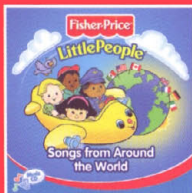

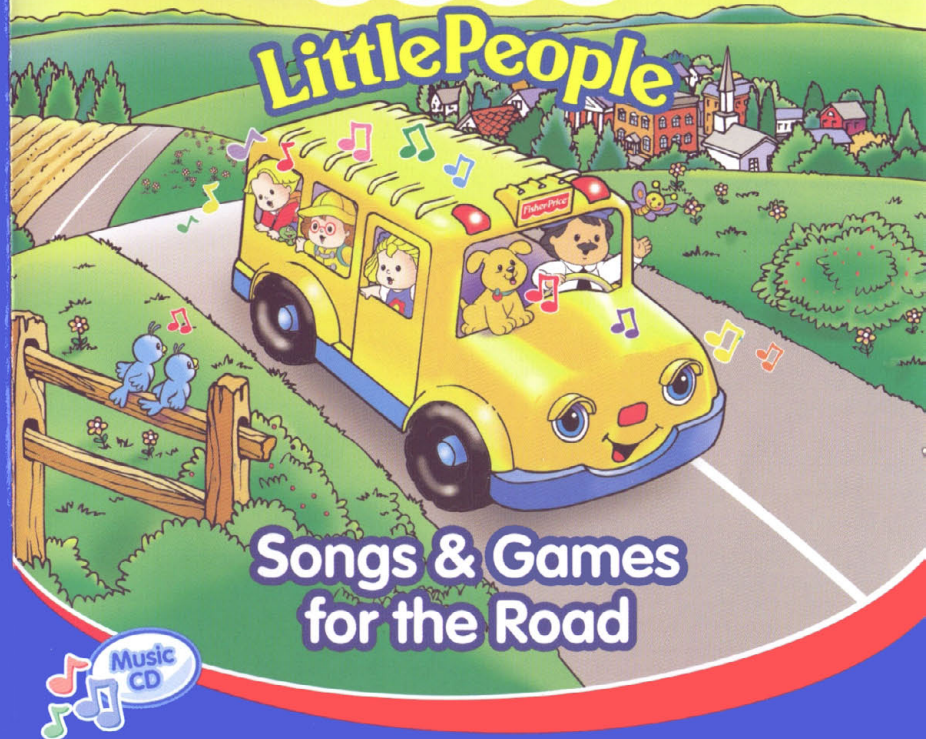

Helpful Advice for using Songs & Games for the Road

1. Sing along!

- Be encouraging; sing for and with your child.
- Be tolerant of mistakes and out of tune singing; we learn music as we learn language — present the model of what is to be done and children slowly get there.
- Don’t worry about the quality of your own singing — enthusiasm and participation is what counts.
- Add words, new endings and responses to the songs to show your child that music is play.
- Encourage your child to listen for the cues to fill in the words or phrases left out of the songs.

2. Play along!

- Encourage your child to invent hand motions and movements to ‘action’ songs like ‘See, See my Playmate’ or ‘The Wheels on the Bus.’ Look for more specific ideas in the ‘More Fun!’ section following the lyric portion of this booklet.
- Count along with songs like ‘Five Little Monkeys’ and ‘One, Two, Buckle my Shoe.’ Look for groups of objects that go with the numbers — for example, on ‘This Old Man’, when he ‘plays three’, look for a group of three trees through the window.
- Try to recall all of the objects in the sequence memory songs, like ‘There’s a Hole in the Bottom of the Sea.’

This clapping game is ideal for two children sitting side by side

The game can be simplified or made more challenging according to the children's own age and ability. The basic game begins with each child clapping their own hands together twice, then clapping both their hands together with their partners, twice. This pattern can continue throughout the whole song, or variety can be added (clap hands twice, then clap their partner's hands individually, etc.)

More Fun!

1. Going on a Roadtrip

'Going on a Roadtrip' begins with the first player telling the others, "I'm going on a roadtrip and I'm bringing luggage (or anything else!). The next player then says "I'm going on a roadtrip and I'm bringing juice (or anything else) and luggage." The game continues with each player adding something else to the list, making sure that every other player's item is listed in the correct order as well.

2. The License Plate Game

The object of this game is to pay attention to the other cars going by on the road and make a list of all the different license plates and the places that they are from. Set a goal of the number of different plates to find, and the first one to reach that goal wins!

3. The Alphabet Game

This game is played by trying to name an object around you that begins with each letter of the alphabet. Look at what is in the car, the things you are passing or other cars going by for objects — 'A' could stand for 'apples' in your cooler, 'B' might be the 'boy' in the car you have just passed. You can take turns by giving each player the next letter, or you can have each player working individually to try and complete their own list of 26 items.

4. Simple arts & crafts

Pack a small bag with items used in simple arts & crafts projects. Stock crayons, markers and paper for drawing; a bag of large, dry pasta and some lengths of yarn for stringing or for older children, a book of easy word-search puzzles makes a great on-the-road activity.
